# AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING BATHING AND SWIMMING

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Nauvoo, that if any person shall bathe, or swim in any waters, within the limits of said city, whereby such person shall be exposed to public view, in a state of nudity, such person shall be subject to a fine of three dollars, for the first offence, to be recovered on complaint before any court competent to try the same; and for the second offence, to the penalty of the Ordinance concerning Vagrants and disorderly persons, passed November 13th, 1841.

Sec. 2. This Ordinance to be in force from and after its passage. Passed June 29th 1843

# HISTORICAL MARKERS

During the last month, three new historical markers have been placed at Mormon sites surrounding the Missouri River. The markers were provided by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Salt Lake and placed by Eagle Scouts.

One marker is in the area of the Grand Encampment, the first headquarters of Brigham Young and the Camp of Israel. This marker is near a new and developing scenic nature trail, lake with a bridge, and a windmill. It is found directly south of Highway 92 and east of Highway 275/375.

Another marker stands at the northeast corner of Kanesville Park, the site of the Kanesville Tabernacle replica. The area for the park has been cleared and landscaping has begun.

The last marker is at the east entrance to Fairview Cemetery in Council Bluffs. It is dedicated to the Kanesville Cemetery and explains that Fairview Cemetery is actually two cemeteries in one. In 1863 it was converted from the Mormon Kanesville Cemetery to the City Cemetery, later given the name of Fairview Cemetery.
